Listen to the beginning of a short solo cantata for voice and piano in which the text looks back on the author's teenage years and describes how he feared losing his close relationship with nature.

If the question had been put to me then,

and if I had been capable of expressing what was in me,

I should have replied:

I want only to keep what I have.

To rise each morning and look out on the sky

and the grassy dew-wet Earth ...
