KAYLEIGH goes.

SHAYMA. Sorry Benedict
I just lost signal on my phone
I promise you I've not fallen behind
I know I ask a lot
But I'm really getting somewhere

And I think it's important
Really important we don't let them off, y'know?
And I know you have concerns—
But I am owed...
I know you'll thank me in the end

SHAYMA hangs up and goes.

FAZIL. Was that...? Is that everything you need? Great. No, I'm fine. I...I do try not to, uh... No I don't mind but, but I do hope that Yeah. That I can let it die now. No. No, not at all. Alright. Thank you. And I can just...? Great. Okay. Great.

FAZIL unclips his microphone and leaves.

3. Zombie Hopkins

GRACE, a journalist, emerges from the COMPANY

GRACE. Pick up your pitchforks – her posthumous popularity is just another grizzly instalment of the Hopkins horror franchise, writes Grace Harwood.

COMPANY. 359 comments

COMPANY. AlanIsAwesome commented on this CorbynIsMyCopilot shared this

GRACE. Like many, I long to bury Hopkins, but I refuse to praise her.

COMPANY. 784 comments

WEBSITE. This comment was removed by a moderator because it didn't abide by our community standards.

GRACE. Ghoulish as it may sound, she would've been delighted to die in the way that she lived – in a manner that kept people talking.

COMPANY, 1041 comments

WEBSITE. Replies may also be deleted. For more detail see our Frequently Asked Questions.

GRACE. I fear the true tragedy may not be the loss of an individual, but the immortalisation of her ideals.

COMPANY. 2328 comments

WEBSITE. Comments will soon be closing on this article. Thank you for your contributions.

Transition to a radio studio. JOEY, a presenter, and MARK, his producer, are now talking to GRACE. A jingle plays them in.

JINGLE. Big news, big views, no holds barred: It's the water cooler with Joey King.

JOEY. Welcome back. Joining me now in the studio is Grace Harwood. Grace is a journalist – a columnist for the *Guardian*, that's right?

GRACE. Yeah. Well, not just... the *Guardian*, yes, amongst others –

JOEY. Sure.

GRACE. But not / in a -

MARK. Doesn't want you labelling her a Guardian writer.

GRACE. No -

JOEY. Ah - I see -

GRACE. No - not at all, / just -

JOEY. Grace would like to distance herself from the lentil-munchers, / but –

MARK. Ooh.

JOEY. Can I say that?

GRACE (laughs). You're... Okay, fine.

JOEY. Do you enjoy a good lentil?

GRACE. I... Sure. On occasion. Why not?

JOEY. Grace Harwood from the *Guardian* with her hot take on lentils, there. Now – seriously – seriously though, Grace is not – no one here is here to talk about... pulses? Mark – lentils – pulses?

MARK. Uh...

JOEY. I would ask Grace but I don't think she'd appreciate it.

MARK. Let's go with pulses.

JOEY. We're going with pulses. But – no, but Grace is here for – oh, okay, you'll like this – Grace has her finger on the pulse of another hot-button issue –

MARK. Nice. Almost worked.

JOEY. Almost, yeah. (*Laughs*.) We're here to talk about the late, great Katie Hopkins, aren't we, Grace?

GRACE. We are.

JOEY. You can't see this at home, but Grace did actually wince a little when I said 'great' just then –

GRACE. No, / that's -

JOEY. Little involuntary wince.

MARK. Little spasm.

JOEY. Tiny spasm. Because – fair to say – you're not her biggest fan, are you?

GRACE. That would be fair to say.

JOEY. Sure. Because this – I have here – this is the article you wrote to mark the, um, the six-month anniversary of her death. Here's the headline: 'Zombie Hopkins: The story that just won't die'.

GRACE. Yes. Now the / thing -

JOEY. And in it, you liken her to a – and I quote – 'a horror-movie monster who can never actually be killed off.' Zombie Hopkins – is that acceptable?

GRACE. I think... and for the record, just to – I do also at one point – I compare her to Jesus, um, rising from the dead, so –

JOEY. Just to make sure you've offended everyone.

GRACE (*laughs*). Ha. Yeah, to – yeah, we're very big on equal-opportunities offence at the *Guardian*.

MARK. Covering all the bases.

GRACE. That's right.

JOEY. But – okay, but in all seriousness – the language here – she's a monster, she's a zombie, she's spreading hate from beyond the grave – that's not –

GRACE. I... I think – the point / of it is –

JOEY. She's got kids – she's got a family out there.

GRACE. Yes, and that is obviously... Obviously that's... And what happened to her was – I'm not suggesting for a moment wasn't utterly despicable –

JOEY. But you think she deserves this?

GRACE. I think – yes! Yes, I... absolutely – one hundred per cent, / because –

JOEY. Really?

GRACE. Because listen – this is exactly the, the sort of fitting tribute she would... Yes, she's dead. Yes, she was killed in an awful, brutal, just absolutely... but – but look at her writing – her own / words – she was –

JOEY. Now hold on -

GRACE. She was the -

JOEY. You're saying she encouraged / whoever -?

GRACE. No! No, no, not for a second. I'm just saying she was the least sentimental, the least mawkish, the least likely to be affected by... You know, the whole, the line – 'show me the bodies – I still don't care'. So, so / she –

JOEY. So you agree?

GRACE. I am saying it's a far more fitting tribute – far more in keeping – than this, this sanctification we're now seeing in some –

JOEY. So this is a tribute piece?

GRACE. No, but -

JOEY. Is 'zombie' a compliment nowadays?

MARK. Zombies are pretty trendy right now, / so -

JOEY. Trendy?

MARK. Sorry, is that not ...? Zombies are 'on fleek' -

JOEY. Jesus.

GRACE. But look – listen – the point I'm making – the point of the article – is that we can't whitewash – we have to remember, in all of this all those things we found unacceptable, or, or offensive, or... That a tragic death doesn't alter what she stood for in life.

JOEY. And you think she'd agree with you on that?

GRACE. Honestly, I do.

JOEY. And do you think you've got a lot else in common?

GRACE. I, uh – (*Laughs*.) no, no I would think that's about it.

JOEY. But that is what we're talking about today – about legacy, about how we should remember – and you think we're getting this wrong?

GRACE. I think yeah. I think there's definitely been a, a rose-tinting, or even a hijacking in some instances, of... I think people are overlooking –

JOEY. So what do we need to know?

GRACE. Look, I'm not trying to prescribe a... Ultimately, I would love us to get to a point where we're not talking about her at all, actually.

JOEY. Right.

GRACE. Because / she isn't –

JOEY. And so that's why you've written this piece about her?

GRACE. I... No, that is... that was to challenge / the narrative of -

JOEY. Right. Well, you're going to stick around and take some calls, if you can bear it. How should we remember Katie Hopkins? That's our topic. Grace Harwood from the *Guardian* wishes she could be forgotten entirely, so that's why she's here live on the air with us. Who's on line one?

ACT TWO, SCENE FIVE

4. How Should We Remember?

It should feel as if the COMPANY in this number are the various callers contacting the radio station – a mixture of grouped and single voices.

JOEY. How should we remember Katie Hopkins? MARK. What did she stand for? JOEY. What are you thinking?

JOEY/MARK. How do you remember Katie Hopkins? GRACE. Pick up your pitchforks JOEY/MARK. Keep people talking

COMPANY. And I think that as a mother And I think you can't forget the kids And I think that as a business – In a business sense she always did –

And I think that on the telly –
On the one with... What was that one called?
When she said that thing about them –
Though I don't agree with that at all

JOEY. Do you still remember Katie Hopkins?

COMPANY. Yeah – and wi' kids, yeah Don't think it's fair to

JOEY. Why should we remember Katie Hopkins? MARK. What should it look like? JOEY. Is this a tribute?

Music shifts.

MARK. Line One:
COMPANY. Did the thing
JOEY. Line Two:
COMPANY. Said the thing
MARK. Line Three:
COMPANY. Controversial

JOEY. Line Four:
COMPANY. On the show
MARK. Line Five:
COMPANY. Got the sack

JOEY. Line Six:
COMPANY. Had the comeback

COMPANY. A strong unapologetic woman And I know, well I'm sure, well I think she'd say –

A strong unapologetic woman
Who was bold, who was brave, well back in the day –

JOEY. How should we remember Katie Hopkins? Do you remember?

Who thinks she stood for –

MARK. Why should we remember Katie Hopkins?

Try to remember
What seems important –

COMPANY. How should we remember Katie?

The COMPANY go.

5. One in a Million

SHAYMA comes forward, making a presentation to a table full of her CO-WORKERS. Perhaps some sort of PowerPoint display accompanies her.

SHAYMA....That's all... You can hear me? Great.
Alright then. I know we're all busy so —
Thanks to Julie for Skyping in, hopefully that's all...
And Benedict, in particular, thank you for,
For this chance to... It has really...

So. McArthur Gledhill.

Twelve dead, including... including, uh,
Alek Nicolescu, who is the cousin of Elena
Who is a cleaner here, and just a...

Just an extraordinary person. So.

So. They aren't saying much,
But what they are saying is this was a,
A perfect storm – totally unpredictable –

Just a one-in-a-million confluence of events
That couldn't have been safeguarded against.
But, but okay, but let's look at those events.

To begin with it was freezing —
Below freezing that night — almost minus-two.
And, um, for any campers amongst you, you'll know —
Staying in a caravan when it's minus-two isn't...
And this was June, so they weren't prepared for it.
Those temperatures can threaten the whole harvest,
Even with, even in the polytunnels, a snap frost can...
So everyone's under pressure.

They have to scrabble around to bring in extra workers – More than they'd been used to housing – More than they could reasonably accommodate, I believe.

So it's minus-two.

And they provide these gas heaters. Calor gas.

Two were recovered, and McArthur Gledhill say

Only one of them was theirs – the other, it must've been –

One of the workers must have snuck it in, and,

And that's important,

Because the coroner did find signs of carbon-monoxide poisoning,

Which could suggest a faulty unit, but what they're saying is 'That wasn't ours – it's not on us.'

And the, the poisoning – that would've been exacerbated by...

They'd sealed the cabin up.

Any cracks – any ventilation – to try and keep the heat in – So the fumes had nowhere to go

And again, McArthur Gledhill say 'look – they were told' – 'They sign terms of occupancy – they knew.'
And the source of the fire itself, it's inconclusive – The investigators did find evidence of cigarettes

Which was forbidden, obviously,
But there's no proof that was how it started

Which may or may not have been smoked within the caravans,

There's no proof they didn't supply the second heater, either, And they can't explain why there were twelve people In a unit meant for six – six at the most.

They claim they were just socialising there, but — But I believe the bedding recovered suggests otherwise And the cot bed — camp bed — There was a camp bed that had to be dragged out And pushed up against the door to use it, To find space for it, so...
At least one of them was conscious — Conscious at some point during the fire — Because they were trying to get that door open They could tell that from the positions of the bodies But the bed, you see, it was lodged in the way — It got stuck. You couldn't...

So if it hadn't been so cold

If they hadn't brought in the extra heater

If they hadn't sealed themselves in

If none of them smoked, maybe

If there weren't so many of them in there

If that camp bed hadn't got stuck...

Who knows?

These people were...
They weren't illegal. They weren't refugees.
They weren't hiding themselves in trucks
Or, or crossing oceans in leaky rowboats –
Not that – not that that would've been any better –
But these people, were... were just people.
Poor and foreign, and... and that was it
Just ordinary people
Trying to do their jobs
And they are entitled –

Y'know where was their march?
Where was their outrage?
Where was their viral campaign?
Their hashtag, their...?
Who had their backs?
It should be us. It should.
I believe that sincerely.

And I think we've a duty
We've a duty to do what we can, y'know?
And I know it won't be easy,

I think it might be up to us But even so

So, who has any questions? We can make sure they aren't forgotten Filmore Kaufman Kane is in a position to help -I think we can help.

Lights down.

KAYLEIGH comes forward. She speaks to us.

KAYLEIGH. One - you've got to get people to care You can do something productive with it. And three - three is actually making sure Two - you've got to find a way to keep their attention

FRANKIE, a vlogger, comes forward.

FRANKIE. Hello YouTube Had a little thought Had to get this out Couldn't sleep last night Hello You'lube

So please stick with me

KAYLEIGH. And a lot of the time, people were... I'm trying to put this nicely... Harmless mostly, but... Sorry -Unfocused. Um. Not necessarily...

FRANKIE. What can we – the online community – I'm proposing a day for Katie. Do to make a real difference, yeah? Let's get this trending. That's #Day4Katie – Let's really push this.

SHAYMA returns, back on the phone. She's in a much better mood

> SHAYMA. Hi there Elena, And now we've got some power on our side We shouldn't get carried away But yes I think it was a massive step

And I'd love to fill you in We're really getting somewhere with the case I think I've finally got some news Hi Beyoncé!

SHAYMA leaves again. And I know - I know it has been -It's so important we didn't give up hope, y'know It shows it's important But we will get there in the end It will be slow

KAYLEIGH. But they weren't ... It was meaningless It was all just -A number of VLOGGERS enter, all making their videos. They weren't doing anything,

VLOGGERS. Hello YouTube

Is offering two-for-one Katie-coladas.
Very strong and very sour, they're not to everyone's taste
But they sure pack a punch!

KAYLEIGH. Just childish. Just ludicrous.

And just when you thought it couldn't get any more –
FRANKIE returns.

FRANKIE. Hello YouTube
Let's not muck about
Hello YouTube
Getting real now

Right. Okay. Here it is.

Because Katie – she made a real impact

And that demands a real, permanent tribute

Check this message out And then stand with me

She rolls up her sleeve to show a large black 'K' tattooed on her wrist.

Here you go. My Special K. Katie, you'll always be with us.

More COMPANY members come forward, all with matching wrist tattoos.

COMPANY. A Special K for a special lady
A Special K to show that you care
A Special K to pay tribute to her
A Special K that will always be there

KAYLEIGH. I mean Jesus. That anyone...
That after everything she could just end up as a meme –
As a joke, actually – as a dare –

RYAN. Okay friends, so here I am –
A bet's a bet – no pussying out.
This one's for you Katie –
Get well soon!

himself on his phone.

More video footage. RYAN is in a tattoo parlour filming

Footage ends. RYAN goes.

KAYLEIGH. I was sick of fakers
All the losers and haters
And the ones who make out they really know her
But still no closer to –

COMPANY. Justice, justice, justice for Katie!

KAYLEIGH. I was sick of coming up short And feeling like a failure And being judged on their mad behaviour And still no closer to –

COMPANY. Justice, justice for Katie!

KAYLEIGH. And I was tired—
I was tired—
Of always being a punchline
Of always being sidelined
Of always losing the headline
To some bleach-blonde bimbo
With ninety thousand subscribers—
And that is tiring.

I was sick – I was sick –

Yes I was sick and tired,
And tired of all of it
But I'm not a quitter
Cos she didn't quit
With all the shit that she got
I thought 'fuck it'
I'm sorry but 'fuck it'
Because she would never go out like this

I needed something lasting
I needed something legitimate
Because she was legit
And people don't see that
And then I had it
Suddenly just had it.

The voice of an official government WEBSITE appears.
This text could be spoken or somehow just projected/shown.
KAYLEIGH sings over it.

KAYLEIGH. Something big - fucking big!

WEBSITE. Three: We check your petition, then publish it.

KAYLEIGH. Go big or go home. Go big like Katie did.

WEBSITE. Four: The Petitions Committee reviews all petitions we publish.

KAYLEIGH. Something substantial. Something positive.

WEBSITE. Five: At ten thousand signatures you get a response from the government.

KAYLEIGH. Something that she might be proud of. Something I could be proud of.

WEBSITE. Six: At one hundred thousand signatures your petition will be considered for a debate in Parliament.

KAYLEIGH. One:
COMPANY. You create
KAYLEIGH. Two:
COMPANY. Find support
KAYLEIGH. Three:
COMPANY. We publish

KAYLEIGH. Four:
COMPANY. We review
KAYLEIGH. Five:
COMPANY. Government
KAYLEIGH. Six:

COMPANY. Government
KAYLEIGH. Six:
COMPANY. They'll debate it

KAYLEIGH/COMPANY. A strong, unapologetic woman Doesn't care — didn't care — Didn't wait to see

A strong, unapologetic woman Who was shrewd – who was smart Undeniably

KAYLEIGH now records her own video, with a link to her parliamentary petition.

KAYLEIGH. Hello friends
Thanks for tuning in
Hello friends
Here's what you can do
Add your name below
Make a real change.

7. Katie's Law

TV studio. A late-night news programme. KAYLEIGH is being interviewed by DOMINIC, a straight-talking, somewhat superior journalist and presenter.

DOMINIC. Joining me now, Kayleigh Harris, founder of the pressure group 'Justice 4 Katie' – Miss Harris, welcome.

KAYLEIGH. Thank you.

DOMINIC. And just so we're clear – Katie Hopkins is the Katie in question?

KAYLEIGH. That's right.

DOMINIC. And you don't believe she's getting justice already?

KAYLEIGH. No, I don't believe that. You only have to look / at how -

DOMINIC. But this is an ongoing investigation – the police / can't just magic up a –

KAYLEIGH. And I understand that, but / the truth of it -

DOMINIC. Resources are limited – she's not the only / unsolved –

KAYLEIGH. Of course not. But actually it's about more than...

Justice in a very real sense, yes, but also about legacy.

DOMINIC. Indeed. Because tonight you're here to talk about your organisation's new initiative, and the petition you're hoping to bring to Parliament. This is 'Katie's Law'?

KAYLEIGH. It is.

DOMINIC. And the gist of this is – and do correct me if I'm wrong – but this petition would *repeal* – you want to get rid of our existing hate-speech legislation?

KAYLEIGH. We... We have a window, post-Brexit, to strip out a lot of unnecessary EU law, and within / that there's a –

DOMINIC. You want - hold on - so hate speech is a good thing?

KAYLEIGH. Free speech – free speech, Dominic. Justice 4
Katie / is –

DOMINIC (with an amused smile). Forgive me for sounding blunt, but have you gone completely insane?

KAYLEIGH. If you'll allow / me to -

DOMINIC. Last year you were working in the charity sector – now you want to start tearing up the Human Rights Act?

KAYLEIGH. Well look – listen – the Human Rights Act is fundamentally, is pretty flawed and redundant, actually, in lots of... but it doesn't have / anything to do with –

DOMINIC. I'm sure there are many millions who / would -

KAYLEIGH. But I'm... But it's not about that. I'm talking about our own actually insane legislation, dressed up in the most misleading language that makes us... So let's get this straight – I'm not saying I'm all for hate speech – I'm saying I'm for free speech, and hate speech doesn't exist.

DOMINIC. It doesn't?

KAYLEIGH. It does not.

DOMINIC, Really?

KAYLEIGH. People use 'hate speech' nowadays to mean any opinion they don't agree with. Well grow up – it's sticks and stones, Dominic – even children know this – sticks and stones may break my bones but words can never hurt me.

DOMINIC. But words can / be used to -

KAYLEIGH. No – it's a nonsense. And we can't make laws against calling people names – that is an abuse – that is dangerous.

DOMINIC. Dangerous how?

KAYLEIGH. By, by – just look! By getting people killed!

DOMINIC. How has -?

KAYLEIGH. By criminalising opinion. By labelling those with controversial opinions criminals – hatemongers – monsters – you legitimise them as targets. You say 'oh, she had it coming' – you are blaming – you are trying to blame women for their own murders – you / are endorsing a –

DOMINIC. But no one - no one has seriously suggested -

KAYLEIGH. They have! Of course they have! Everywhere you look in this liberal, all-welcoming utopia we are being taught that it's more of a crime for a woman to speak her mind than it is to murder that woman in cold blood! This / is the —

DOMINIC. Now come / on, there has been -

KAYLEIGH. Open – open your eyes, Dominic! Look!
Everyone knows this. We saw... We watched a prominent
British figure gunned down in our capital city, and twentyfour hours later we saw celebrations, people who came to, to
celebrate in the streets, just like – like the Muslim – the Arab
countries after 9/11, taking / pleasure in the death of –

DOMINIC. Hold on - now just hold on, you're not suggesting -

KAYLEIGH. Of - of one of our own - of a / respected -

DOMINIC. But those people weren't... They weren't foreigners or Muslims, were they? / They were British –

KAYLEIGH. I believe some were, but...

DOMINIC. We're talking a handful of people / in, in Glasgow, and...

KAYLEIGH. People gloating - people / taking pleasure in -

DOMINIC. And people who would – under your proposal – get off scot-free?

KAYLEIGH. No. Not free from criticism. And we already have plenty of laws for public conduct, uh, violence, vandalism, destruction of property – actual crimes –

DOMINIC. Alright, okay, but I guess what I'm... In this day and age, with all the anger, the violence, the bloodshed on our streets – how can you look at that and say 'yes, a little bit more hate is just what we need'?

KAYLEIGH. Because we do! A little bit of hate is... There's nothing wrong with that – not when you're at war. You say 'hate', I say passion. I say it is justified, it is right – to hate some things – to hate violence and hypocrisy and yes – and the influx of, of radical foreign ideologies who hate women

and freedom and act in the most repellent, oppressive... I am proud to hate them. I hate the erosion of our communities and jobs and values and being told that we are to blame – not the Government, not the terrorists, not the media elite, but *us* – we're garbage, we're terrible, we should be ashamed of ourselves. Enough! It is a national joke, and I don't find it funny any more.

DOMINIC. And this is... A lot of your rhetoric would certainly seem to echo Katie Hopkins' own. But you weren't always a fan, were you?

KAYLEIGH. I... I wasn't... I think like a lot of people I didn't always / appreciate how –

DOMINIC. 'How can anyone defend her? How do you even start to say something nice about someone so toxic?'

KAYLEIGH. Okay, so let's just... It's that kind of ignorance that I / really –

DOMINIC. Those were your words – written the morning after her death, in fact – in an internal email to one of your then-colleagues –

KAYLEIGH. I... Let me... I wasn't...

DOMINIC. You went on to call her 'poisonous', 'hateful', 'someone / who – '

KAYLEIGH. Okay, okay, that's... So this is... clearly this is an ambush, a / hijacking, but –

DOMINIC. 'No one should want any association with, alive or dead.'

KAYLEIGH. And I... as I said, I didn't initially, I / admit -

DOMINIC. And this is a -1'm told this is a vomiting emoji, you sent / to -

KAYLEIGH. Right. Yes. I wasn't... But also, let me be clear – this isn't really about Katie Hopkins. The / whole –

DOMINIC. It isn't?

KAYLEIGH. No. This / goes far beyond -

DOMINIC. Justice 4 Katie isn't about Katie Hopkins?

KAYLEIGH. I... obviously / there's -

DOMINIC. Katie's Law isn't about Katie Hopkins?

KAYLEIGH. Listen, Dominic, you can bully me all you like I shan't be intimidated.

DOMINIC. I'm only quoting / your own -

KAYLEIGH. I know what I believe in. I'm not ashamed of it.

DOMINIC. Very well. One final question: 'crackpots, Nazis and the mentally ill', that's how you described Ms Hopkins' supporters at the time. Do you feel at home amongst them now?

KAYLEIGH. I... I don't recall ever... They are, uh, very fine people, and I am proud to represent them.

DOMINIC. And that's all we have time for. Kayleigh Harris, thank you for joining us.

8. Have You Seen This? (Part 1)

Music plays. The COMPANY come forward as various online commenters, talking about the interview we've just seen.

COMPANY. Have you seen this?

Were you watching this last night?

Have you seen this?

Swear this woman's proper crazy!

Have you seen this? Right-wing scum is getting owned!

Have you seen this? Look at her, she's full-on Nazi!

BRANDON updates his status.

9. Allahu Akbar, Motherfucker

A Tube carriage. SHAYMA (wearing a headscarf) sits. MAN I is standing, swaying slightly, in front of her. He is well-spoken, wears a smart suit and appears drunk. He is filming her on his phone, and we also see this footage projected live. Other members of the COMPANY present as other commuters.

MAN 1 (*to* SHAYMA). Say something then. Go on. Say something to the boys and girls at home.

SHAYMA angles herself away from him.

What? What's the matter? Hello? Can you hear me?

MAN 2. Here, mate, come on -

MAN 1 (ignoring this). Do you speak English? English? Parlez-vous Anglais? (Giggles.) Are you allowed to speak?

MAN 2. Knock it off -

MAN 1. You're not, are you? Back home they're not... not allowed out of the house without a, a man, a minder.

MAN 2. Mate -

MAN 1. Who's minding you?

MAN 2. Mate, can / you just -?

MAN 1 (now turning around). Look, just fuck – fuck off, I'm not your mate, so –

MAN 2. Take it / easy.

MAN 1. I'm having a conversation. I'm allowed to do that. We are still allowed to... She isn't, obviously, but in this country – in this / country, right –

SHAYMA. Can you stop filming me please?

MAN 1. She speaks! She can! It's a miracle!

WOMAN. Leave her alone.

MAN 1. Does no one else...? I'm trying to get to the bottom of... I'm doing you all a public service. She's probably... Y'know they send the – their women and children, all wired up, all... (*Back to SHAYMA*.) What's in your bag?

SHAYMA gets up and tries to move away. He blocks her path.

Hey! Hey! Not so fast –

SHAYMA. Excuse me please.

MAN 1. Where do you think you're going?

SHAYMA. Home.

MAN 1. Oh, home. Great. No, that's... When's your flight then? Home! When are you going to fuck off out of here?

MAN 2 now tries to get between them.

MAN 2. That's enough / now. Just –

MAN 1. I have warned / you not to -

MAN 2. You've had a bit much. You're / making a –

MAN 1. Back off – just back off mate, alright? I saw her first, so... Fucking White-Knighting all over... No. (*Back to SHAYMA*.) How much though? Go on – I mean it – how much?

SHAYMA. Don't touch me.

MAN 1. I'm joking! Jesus – it's a fucking... You think I'd touch you? You couldn't pay me, love. Fucking hell. Don't... Don't you look down your nose at me. Your days are numbered. We're coming for you. We're waking up. We're done with... just you wait. You'll come begging, on – on your hands and knees – for a big strong man like me. So what d'you say?

as we cut to an interview. She sings to us. Lights suddenly shift. All apart from SHAYMA are frozen,

SHAYMA. He wasn't a partner A going-places person, y'know But he was probably going to be a partner If not there then somewhere

And that's the real problem These people are people And he wasn't a monster In a sort of unimaginative way Not quite as charming as he thought he was And he could be quite charming These people aren't monsters Um, and not unattractive

Until it wasn't fine... But basically fine Thought it was friendly, And I don't think I encouraged -And there are rules of course about workplace... Because monsters are easy

MAN 1. Ah! Fuck! Fucking bitch! What did I...? Jesus!

The projected image freezes.

11. Colossal Lady Balls

A late-night comedy show. The host, behind a desk, is STUART. To his side, two guests, TERRY and PIPPA.

STUART. Well, that is one badass Jihadi mother-[bleeped]

Studio laughter.

I mean it. How cool is she? Now – okay, look – now I'm not condoning this entirely. I would like to say that violence isn't always the answer, but *come on*. She is – Pippa, am I right?

PIPPA. Oh yeah. Amazing. She's like a, a feminist Islamic Arnold Schwarzenegger.

TERRY. I think you've just described most of Stu's sexual fantasies.

STUART. Yeah, it's a – no, it's a niche set of filters on Pornhub, I'll admit that.

PIPPA. Jesus.

STUART. Damn right though. I love her. I do. Come on — who's not a little turned on watching that? Who doesn't have a big old boner for aggressive multiculturalism? It's nothing to be ashamed of.

TERRY. You've plenty to be ashamed of.

STUART. Shut your face. So, so this woman, she's been identified – her name is Shayma Hussaini. She is – British citizen, not that it matters – smart woman – trainee human-rights lawyer – one of the good guys, no question. And / she has –

PIPPA. Has she got into trouble for this?

STUART. She – so she's been let off with a caution for now.

Been getting – getting a lot of stick online – lot of the usual –

TERRY. And it is a bit... I don't know, not to be... But I mean for a lawyer, it's not the smartest... 'Yes, m'lud, in my defence I would say I was shouting "Allahu Akbar" ironically –

More laughter.

STUART. Alright, sure, but even so - the balls on her, right?

PIPPA. Colossal lady-balls, absolutely.

TERRY. That's your, um, that's your superhero name, isn't it? PIPPA. Captain Colossal Lady Balls. Uh-huh.

STUART (through laughter). Okay, okay, but, but no, I think she's a hero – genuine hero. I do. I think – alright, this is the point: Yes, she escalated, and, and just thank God we're not in America and this cock-weasel wasn't armed, but ultimately she stood up for herself, she refused to play the victim, and she kicked some ass. So, Shayma Hussaini – I might rather have you in my corner in a street-fight than a murder trial, but nonetheless I salute you. You are Late Night Fight's Inappropriate Role Model of the week.

A jingle plays.

BAND. 'Inappropriate Role Model of the Week!'

STUART. Lovely stuff. Brilliant. Now moving on. Moving on, it's time to name our Weekly Wanker –

BAND. 'Late Night Fight's Weekly Wanker Late Night Fight's Weekly Wanker Wanker of the Week!'

TERRY. Late Night Fight's Weekly Wanker is brought to you by Kleenex tissues: Kleenex, the wanker's choice.

STUART. Stop it – stop saying that – it's not – you're going to get us sued.

More laughter.

Right. Okay, right – now, Pippa, as our guest of honour we asked you to pick our wanker this week. So who did you come up with?

PIPPA. Yes. Lots of tempting options. Spoilt for choice, really, but I've gone for a somewhat lesser-known wanker, I think, and that is Kayleigh Harris.

TERRY. Who?

PIPPA. Exactly.

TERRY. Is this just someone you went to school with? Because that's a pretty... impressively petty, but –

STUART. No, this is – I know this person – I did recognise her when I looked her up – she, she has this organisation – 'Justice 4 Katie' –

PIPPA. Yep.

TERRY. Katie who?

STUART. That would be Katie Hopkins.

TERRY. Oh Jesus.

STUART (*laughing*). Yeah. I know, but... Anyway, she's got this petition going, and she did an interview last week with... Well, let's just have a look –

A clip from KAYLEIGH's interview plays.

KAYLEIGH. A little bit of hate is... There's nothing wrong with that – not when you're at war. You say 'hate', I say passion. I say it is justified, it is right – to hate some things – to hate violence and hypocrisy and yes – and the influx of, of radical foreign ideologies who hate women and freedom and act in the most repellent, oppressive... I am proud to hate them.

Clip ends.

STUART. And that's quite enough of that.

TERRY. Just a spoonful of hatred helps society collapse -

STUART. Okay. Okay, so Pip – this petition she's started – do you want to give us the gist of it?

PIPPA. Sure. So she's basically – and it's pretty bold – but essentially she's saying what the world needs now is more hate speech.

TERRY, Uh -

STUART. Right. So it's... It's basically the whole 'free speech' argument, isn't it?

PIPPA. Yeah, in a 'let's put *Mein Kampf* on the National Curriculum' sort of way.

TERRY. Well I think she sounds lovely.

STUART. No, I mean she is batshit, undeniably, but, but we also found this – you're going to love it – just take a look Roll the clip.

Another 'clip' plays, and/or is performed live. This is an auto-tuned remix of the interview.

REMIX. Okay Let's get this straight

Justice 4 Katie is Flawed and redundant

OLLIE, late teens, enters. He's dressed in drag, in a crude and glammed-up version of KAYLEIGH's interview outfit. It should be clear who he's meant to look like.

STUART. He loves it really. Now remember, these are all the exact words you said, Miss Harris – we might've just had a little fun with the order of them. Thanks to my guests, Pippa Goldstein and Terry Drake, thank you all for watching, and we'll see you next week. Goodnight.

OLLIE and the BAND perform a lounge/swing version of the remixed song. It could be a bit of a budget production number, with 'Katie' cancan girls, etc. We might also see the footage from the original interview played behind them, cut to fit.

OLLIE. Okay

We now gradually move into the characters from 'Where Were You When?' First up, PAM, RICHARD and NINA.

PAM. And it was - who was it?

RICHARD. Cynthia.

PAM. No, it wasn't Cynthia. She was -

RICHARD. Wine-club Cynthia.

PAM. Oh yes. Yes, that Cynthia. Our friend Cynthia, and she said –

Now SHAYMA and KARL have also joined in.

NINA. And Charles Dickens – Dickens is interesting actually, because we think of him as... But he, um, he wanted to talk about the poor laws, about cruelty to children, Government corruption –

KARL. It was mental.

NINA. Things nobody else is -

KARL. And it was mental how mental it got, looking back at it.

SHAYMA. I'm sorry, what's this for?

NINA. So he gets on stage, and he courts controversy, and he says some shocking, some awful things about –

BRIAN. Do we want to give those kind of people a voice? Honestly?

OWEN. Because you can't silence... People, those kind of people, they're going to go online and find out whatever anyway so I say just get it all out there.

COMPANY. And I think a sense of humour And I think she always spoke her mind

And I think that there was anger But it does no good to be unkind

Still it's hard to remember
What she stood for – fought for – I recall

But I think that you should leave her If you've nothing nice to say at all

Now KAYLEIGH has joined the group. One by one, having spoken, the others will draw back, leaving her by herself.

KAYLEIGH. We all live in our own little bubbles. I was in my own lovely little left-wing bubble where we were all happy and nice we're all nice to each other and enraged by the same things and we don't –

RICHARD. But I think ultimately -

PAM. I say rest in peace – I say draw a line and –

RICHARD. And there's an end to it.

KAYLEIGH. We don't realise the strength of feeling that comes from other places.

NINA. So that is a, uh, a legacy of sorts, I suppose.

KAYLEIGH. We don't listen.

KARL (chuckles). Like a dream, almost.

KAYLEIGH. We don't hear any voices other than our own, and that, that is...

OWEN. And I don't think - no - I don't think it's actually going to make anyone support the Westboro Baptist Church. No.

KAYLEIGH. Dangerous. Actually dangerous.

BRIAN. I think the less said about her now the better.

KAYLEIGH. And those voices, they have to be big and brash and extreme – to cut through –

SHAYMA. Are we done? Thank you

KAYLEIGH. But without a voice you're nothing.

COMPANY. How should we remember Katie Hopkins?
Try to be kind, but
No sugar-coating

Why should we remember Katie Hopkins?

None of this spiteful —

None of this gloating —

How can we remember Katie Hopkins?
Who really knew her?
Who can be certain?

Who thinks they remember Katie Hopkins?
Who has a picture?
Who knew the person?

KAYLEIGH. Katie Hopkins is free speech. Like it or not, she is the entry point into the argument and from there you find your own way, but without her... It takes someone special, someone Teflon, and I realised... That wasn't me. Because there was a moment, a moment after my, uh, my own little public shaming, when I could've really doubled down, leant into it, embraced that whole kind of unapologetic public enemy sort of, of... and I was tempted, and in some ways it was probably the closest, actually, I ever got to properly understanding her, a little glimpse of what it must've been like to... And I couldn't. I didn't want it. Because what must it do to you? (Beat.) Anyway. No, no regrets. That's another philosophy: no regrets allowed. YOLO. Do you remember when we used to say YOLO? (Laughs.) Right. Great. Is that everything?

KAYLEIGH starts removing her microphone as others come forward as JOURNALISTS.

JOURNO 1. Amongst the losers in last night's local elections, Kayleigh Harris. The former charity worker and founder of the ill-fated Justice 4 Katie movement failed to / gain a –

JOURNO 2. Another farcical setback for the England football team, sent crashing / out of –

JOURNO 3. An investigation into the deaths of twelve fruitpickers in Kent has found no evidence of wrongdoing. Justice Peters said while this was an unspeakable tragedy, there / was no –

JOURNO 4. In other news, the Metropolitan Police issued a statement today saying they were suspending their investigation into the murder of media personality Katie Hopkins. Hopkins' death sparked public outcry and even mass demonstrations last year, but a spokesperson said there was no new evidence with which to continue their inquiries. Now we go to Tina with the weather.

JOURNALISTS go. KAYLEIGH has now finished taking off her microphone. She passes SHAYMA entering. They recognise each other but don't speak. KAYLEIGH leaves.

15. British Justice

A press conference. SHAYMA stands centrally. ELENA to one side, CATALINA to the other. Various JOURNALISTS watch them.

ELENA. Good afternoon, my name is Elena Nicolescu.

CATALINA. Hello, I am Catalina Cotrus.

SHAYMA. And I am Shayma Hussaini –
You might remember me from such viral sensations
As 'Muslim psycho on the Tube'
And 'Drunk intern slams bosses'.
Um. Best to get that out of the way with.
Not my finest hours. Ahem. Anyway.
We are here today to officially launch British Justice,
A new not-for-profit organisation.
British Justice might not be what you think it is
But it means exactly what it sounds like.

Making sure the British justice system works For anyone who finds themselves here, Be they foreign nationals, refugees, Asylum-seekers or native citizens, That our British values of democracy, Of tolerance, acceptance and compassion Are upheld and extended to all.

We have a proud justice system –
One of the best in the world
And it's there for everyone
That's the reason it exists
But not everyone knows about it
Not everyone understands it
But the whole point of it being there
Is to protect those people –
The most vulnerable –
To ensure justice isn't reserved
For the wealthy, for the privileged,
For the ones who know how it works.

Justice shouldn't be selective
It shouldn't be able to be bought or sold
Or based on what you know or who you know
That's the idea, anyway
And that's the idea of us.
To provide / justice –

She is interrupted by a bleeping message.

COMPANY. Have you seen this?

SHAYMA. To provide justice – to be a voice for the voiceless – More bleeps and messages. One by one the JOURNALISTS start to go to their phones, singing their messages.

COMPANY. Have you seen this?
Don't believe a word of it.

SHAYMA. Providing free legal counsel – Counsel to those who don't realise they're entitled to it –

COMPANY. Have you seen this?

Have you seen this?
Urgent breaking
Have you seen this?

SHAYMA. We're here because we believe justice shouldn't come with a price tag, that –

Now she's totally lost them.

COMPANY. We're getting news that there has been There has been some / kind of Kind of emerging – Some urgent – Emergency –

Have you seen this?
Someone / get on this right now
Get on this before we lose this story

Have you seen this?
Swear to / God you won't believe it
God you won't believe these people!
Have you seen this?

Have you seen this?
It's / the one we're waiting for
The one that everybody's dreading

Have you seen this?

Drop it and call me – call me now!

Stop what you're doing!
Have you seen this?
Have you seen this?
